Monster playground opens at Flagstone in time for school holidays

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ONE of the biggest new playgrounds in southeast Queensland opens at Flagstone on Saturday, December 15, ready for the first day of the school holidays.

The community will get its first look — and first chance to try — the \$4 million adventure playground as the state's 800,000 school students head into the long summer break.

The construction fence will come down and the fireworks will go up for a free community Christmas party overflowing with music, food and fun, from 4pm to 8pm. The celebration will end with a bang as the playground lights up with fireworks and a laser light show.

There will be plenty of free entertainment for the family including markets, card making, Santa's photobooth, children's parade, facepainting, rides and candy.

Santa's elves have put the finishing touches to the playground with its climbing tower, skybridge and cabins — sitting up to three-storeys high with a birds' eye view of the festivities. The race is on to be one of the first to try the flying foxes, slides, swings and in-ground trampolines.

The adventure playground is the centrepiece in the Flagstone Regional Park, which is being developed in stages over four years at a cost of \$12 million.

The 10 hectare site already includes a water-based dog park and competition skate plaza with a storybook trail, pump track, fitness hub and maze among the activities still to come.

This week, developers Peet Limited and Logan City Council announced they will jointly build a dynamic water playground which is expected to open for Christmas next year.
