In other development news...

Design and delivery of future neighbourhoods at Flagstone is on track, with various Development Applications (DA) currently with the State Government for assessment. This process allows for matters such as open space, public transport, job creation and delivery of the town centre to progress and ensures optimal liveability for the community.



Construction of the District Community Centre site is progressing well, with the works to create the connecting road (Parklands Drive) forecast to be completed later this year. This is an exciting step as it's the first step in delivering the 126ha town centre. Additional car parking has been made available in surrounding areas to offset the loss of the car parks directly adjoining the Adventure Park.

We're aware of the communities' calls for additional childcare in Flagstone. As such, two additional child care sites are set to be delivered. One is currently under construction and the second — which also includes a learn to swim facility — is in the final stages of receiving town planning approval.

The new Vista Park in Stage 3 is on track for completion in December and will feature a basketball half court, two park shelters, picnic furniture, open kick-around area and play equipment.



You will no longer receive your waste vouchers in the mail. Council have moved to digital waste vouchers.

The benefits of going online include:

- **Convenience** Your vouchers can be accessed anywhere, anytime from your phone, computer or other smart device. You also have the flexibility to print the vouchers or email them to your tenant.
- Eco-friendly They don't use paper.
- Reliable You can't lose or damage a digital voucher.
- Secure Only you can access your digital vouchers using your online account.

Flagstone residents have access to four digital waste vouchers a year. To access your vouchers, head to logan.qld.gov.au/digital-waste-vouchers and have your assessment rates number available.

State Government Update

Planning for growth in Flagstone

The Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) recently released its 2021 Census Data which shows just over 7,000 residents now call Flagstone home.

This data is absolutely essential in helping all levels of government plan for infrastructure and services in communities. This is why I so strongly encourage our residents to participate in Census Night.

The Queensland Government, through Economic Development Queensland (EDQ), has also recently approved an important Planning Framework, as well as reports and maps that will guide the provision of infrastructure and services within the Greater Flagstone Priority Development Area (PDA), including for Flagstone.



While these documents are technical, they set out clear timeframes for the delivery of our infrastructure and services such as:

- Water supply
- Sewerage supply
- Roads (within and outside the PDA)
- Parks and open space
- Local community facilities
 (e.g. community centres, libraries)
- State community facilities
 (e.g. emergency services, schools)

The timeframes are mostly based on either population levels or number of dwellings (i.e. houses) and they extend to the year 2066.

For example, the trigger for the delivery of a police station is when the population level in the Greater Flagstone area reaches 20,000 to 30,000 residents. A primary school trigger is one school for every 3,000 dwellings.

Developers are also required to deliver infrastructure as part of conditions on their development approvals. A good example of this is Peet, your Flagstone developer, is obligated to deliver the extension of New Beith Road providing a secondary access from Flagstone when the development reaches 1,350 lots.

The delivery of this enabling infrastructure is a shared responsibility between the State Government, the Logan City Council and local developers in the Greater Flagstone PDA.

Carl Barron, Paul Harragon, Don Bradman, Shane Warne.






Primary School

Proud celebration of NAIDOC Week

Flagstone State School recently held our NAIDOC Week assembly. This year's theme was Get Up! Stand Up! Show Up!, encouraging all of us to champion change among our peers and to celebrate those who have driven positive change for First Nations peoples and communities.

Over 60 students proudly identify as Aboriginal and/ or Torres Strait Islander at our school. All students spent NAIDOC Week accessing and enjoying the Indigenous Garden and Yarning Circle, learning about First Nations cultures and customs through dance, song, Indigenous sporting games, reading stories, and listening to guest speakers.

Year 6 students and our Indigenous Champion for the school delivered a beautiful Acknowledgement of Country, Flagstone State School principal Mrs Roz Clay spoke about why an Acknowledgement or a Welcome to Country is delivered at important meetings. She said, "Welcoming people to Country is a traditional practice of special importance. We should all respect the land and the people who have important connections to it. At Flagstone State School, it is with pride that we acknowledge and continue these traditions now and into our future."

Prep students presented a song "Taba Naba" from the Torres Strait Islands, the school choir performed "Inanay" in Yorta Yorta language, and Year 2 students also presented "Heads, Shoulders, Knees, and Toes" in Yugambeh language.

High School Planning our high school's future

The re-design of a masterplan for Flagstone State Community College is underway. It seeks to increase the school's enrolment capacity to 1,600 students and provide additional state of the art facilities that meet the 21st century learning needs of our students.

Proposed plans allow for the progressive construction of new buildings as enrolments grow. The first stage includes additional general learning classrooms for junior secondary classes, as well as undercover and shaded play and seating areas, and new carparking areas. Subsequent stages include a tiered auditorium available for community use, new basketball courts with hospitality space, additional senior classrooms, staff rooms, canteen and refurbishment of our performing arts facilities including the creation of a large theatre.

With the recent state budget announcing funding for the construction of a new primary school in our community, and the current expansion of Flagstone State Primary School, these new plans seek to future-proof our college and ensure we continue to have excellent facilities that meet the needs of our growing community.



Tigers Tag is back!

Summer swim safety tips

Enjoying the water in summer is an Aussie way of life, but is your family 'summer-ready'?

The team at Splash Leisure Learn to Swim in Flagstone Central want to remind all Flagstonians to adopt these **4 key tips** from the Royal Life Saving Society's "Keep Watch" campaign -Supervise, Restrict, Teach, Respond.



Actively **SUPERVISE** children around water.

Children must be supervised by an adult when in, on, or around water. Most children who drown in home pools fall in by accident, with tragedy striking quickly and silently.

Supervising adults must be within arms' reach, interacting with your child in the water, ready to respond if needed.

Active supervision means focusing all your attention on your child, all the time.

Research shows that any distractions, such as using mobile phones or doing household chores, while children are near water, increases their risk of drowning.



RESTRICT children's access to water.

Children have commonly gained unsupervised access to pool areas through a fence or gate which had fallen into disrepair, or the lack of a fence or a gate because it has been deliberately propped open. Remember to remove all climbable objects near pool fences such as pot plants, tables or chairs.

Pool toys also need to be securely stored out of sight and reach of children and never left in the pool when not in use as they can attract the attention of children who may try to get to them.

Water safety applies to more than your pool.

There can be drowning hazards hidden in plain sight. In rural communities, troughs, irrigation channels, water tanks, ditches and post holes can all pose dangers.

In backyards, there are paddling pools, spas, baths, toilets, ponds, wheelbarrows, buckets, eskies, or even pet bowls that can present a risk. Essentially, anything that contains water is a potential drowning hazard for 0 to 5 year olds. Older children, from 5 to 14 years old, are most at risk of drowning in swimming pools, rivers, creeks, lakes and dams.

Children should always be prevented from playing in or near flood waters, especially storm water drains.



TEACH children water safety skills.


