Tree-mendous Christmas spirit at Lakelands

There was plenty of Christmas cheer when more than 100 Lakelands and Lattitude residents came together to decorate a special Christmas tree made by the Lattitude Men's Shed.

Designed and built by Ted Richardson, Peter Nash, Kevin Cunningham and Alan Dunsire, the 2.4 metre handcrafted timber Christmas tree was the brainchild of the local Link Up Group.

Ted said the four men came up with a simple, minimalist design of a trunk and branches extending right and left.

"We painted the tree white and added a couple of stars to get the decorations started. We then drilled multiple holes in the cross branches to accommodate many more decorations," Ted said.

The Lakelands community was quick to take on the challenge at the 'Deck The Halls' event where the tree was transformed from top to bottom with handcrafted festive creations.

As well as making decorations, attendees of all ages wrote letters to Santa, made reindeer cookies and designed Christmas cards.

Representatives from Lakelands Primary School hosted a food stall and brought along a big red Santa sleigh to collect food donations for Halo Team Inc., a local charity that supports people in need.

At the end of the evening the decorated tree looked spectacular.

The tree remained on display over the festive season and is now safely packed away until next Christmas.

Life at Lakelands just became more colourful

More than 250 students from Lakelands Primary School and Mandurah Baptist College have added a riot of colour to our community with the help of local artist Bec Inwood.

Bec was the driving force behind the new Lakelands community mural and yarn bomb public art project.

Taking place over more than 84 hours in a two-month period, the project successfully engaged local children and families at a series of workshops to paint images of 'what they love to do'.

The final product is a striking and a stand-out new addition to Lakelands.

It was also an all-'round community effort that involved children from the local school, Girl Guides, Lakelands Playgroup and residents from Lattitude Lakelands.

Made from 256 hand-painted wooden panels, the giant new mural is sure to brighten up everyone's day.

Is it a bird, is it a man? No it's a microbat!

Did you know a microbat can eat 1,000 mosquitos in one night!

Lakelands Primary School students and parents discovered this and lots more about bat breeds, while attending a Bat Box Building Workshop at the school.

Peet put on the afternoon tea while local expert Joe Tonga facilitated the special twohour session for 18 students and parents too.

Joe took the group through all the fascinating facts about the bats in the greater Mandurah region and the important role they play in the environment.

Students then split into small groups to construct the bat boxes - gluing and screwing the wooden pieces together and finishing them off by carefully sanding down the corners and sides.

"The students were very eager to learn and so excited to be making new homes for local bats," said Joe.

"I have installed six of the seven boxes produced during the session near Black Swan Lake and I have put one near the school in Yindarra Park, allowing the students to see one of their boxes in action.

"Helping to reduce the mosquito population in a natural and fun way is a 'win-win' scenario."

Lakelands Primary School science and health teacher Tracy Hill said the students really enjoyed themselves and loved having their parents in the workshop to share the experience.

"The students were able to make the boxes with very little help from the adults, giving them a real sense of achievement - I was so impressed," Tracy said.

"It was a really valuable experience for the students and a great opportunity for them to learn about the local environment."




