What's your special space? You'll find heaps to choose from in Henley Bushland. Take an adult with you and go exploring. Another great way to enjoy your space is with a family picnic, where you can all discover the different animals and plants that call the area home.

### 3 Natural Works Of Art

Why not enjoy a family walk along the nearby bushland trails this weekend? While you're there, make sure to collect as many natural objects as possible. Feathers, rocks, sticks, flowers –all can be used to make a sculpture that other people can look at and enjoy as they walk along the trail. If you're feeling extra creative, why not make several sculptures along the trail? Or, take home as many natural materials as you can carry and get arty at home. Using glue, string or sticky tape, make a sculpture out of your materials. Then, display your finished artwork in your front garden for all your neighbours to admire.

Once you're done, round up the family and head to Maldon Park. 
#### **7** Let's Go Fly A Kite!

Can you fly a kite? Head to the big grassed open spaces at your local park to find out! Making your own kite is easy. All you'll need is some newspaper, skewers or two thin sticks (one longer than the other), some stick tape and string.

- 1. Take the shorter stick and place it over the longer stick to make a t-shape, and bind together with sticky tape and string.
- Cover the t-shape with newspaper, and remember to keep it light!
- Poke two holes in the newspaper at the top and bottom.
- 4. Cut a piece of string a little longer than the large stick.
- 5. Lay the string along the kite, feed through the holes and tie onto the stick. Secure with sticky tape. This is called a brindle.
- 6. Measure and cut a piece of string 10 large steps long. This is the bit you will hold on to when you fly the kite.
- 7. Find a stick and wrap the string around it to create your own spool.
- Tie the end of your string to the brindle about 1/3 of the way down. This may have to be adjusted as you test your kite.
- Make a tail for your kite out of leaves, feathers and string but don't make it too heavy.
- 10. Now it's time to test your kite. How high can your kite fly?

### **8** Creative Costumes

Why not be a prince or princess for a day? Or a lion, a soldier, or your favourite cartoon character? First, you'll need the right costume, and your local bush trails are the perfect spot to find some materials. Create a crown from feathers and leaves, or make a wand out of a stick and come up with some cool magic spells.



### 9 Bush Walk

Did you know Wellard is surrounded by beautiful bushland? There are some awesome bushland trails to explore, including Kwinana Loop Trail, which goes all the way around Wellard. It's a long trail, so it's probably better to tackle it in sections. Or, if you have a bike, why not pack some food in a backpack and go on a cycling adventure for the day! Whatever you choose to do, just make sure you're accompanied by a parent or guardian.
